

# GUIDE FOR ADVOCATES AT DURB MEETINGS

A tool to assist **patients and advocates** when preparing oral or written comments for **Medicaid DUR Board** meetings.

### What is a Medicaid DUR Board?

When **new medications** come on the market, they must go through a review by the state to decide where it will be placed on the **drug formulary** for **Medicaid**. These reviews take place by **Drug Utilization Review Boards** (**DUR Boards**).

### **How Can Advocates Join DUR Board Meetings?**

The **patient perspective** is important, because only a patient understands how their disease impacts their day-to-day life. Most **DUR Board meetings** have space for **patient testimony** – in either oral or written form.

### What Should You Talk (or Write) About?

You are an expert in what it is like to live with sickle cell. You can make an impact by talking about how sickle cell affects your physical and mental health, challenges your daily life, or results in out-of-pocket expenses.

# GLOSSARY OF TERMS FOR DURB MEETINGS

A guide for definitions of terms used in this toolkit:



## **Drug Utilization Review Board** (DUR Board)

A group of stakeholders that come together to evaluate and **provide recommendations** for the **Medicaid** preferred drug list (or **drug formulary**).



### **Drug Formulary**

A list of medications or "preferred drugs" that an insurance company agrees to cover the cost of under a particular health insurance plan.



#### Medicaid

A state insurance program that helps with medical costs for some people with limited income and resources.

Every state's Medicaid program is different!



### **Out-of-Pocket Expenses**

The money that you pay for medical bills or services and do not receive reimbursement or refunds for. This is how much you spend (out of your own pocket) to treat your sickle cell.
